## Notices for the week

Today we begin the most important week in the Church's Year: it is very strange that we are not able to celebrate it together, but we must remember that in prayer we are never separated from one another. For the first time in our lives, all the Churches are closed; so we need to make an extra effort to share in the offering which is being made inside them. It is very important that we observe the rules about 'social distancing' in order to keep ourselves and others safe from the pandemic of Covid 19. But it is just as important that we join together in our celebration of Holy Week. I hope you will by now have received a copy of the booklet to help us to celebrate Holy Week in our own homes and a Palm Cross, which has already been blessed. With this Newssheet, you will also receive an electronic copy of the booklet in case that makes it easier for you. If you would like a 'hard copy' of the booklet, let me know and I shall deliver one to you at home or send it by post. If you do not have a Palm Cross, there will be some available on the altar in the porch at S. Silas, during the usual morning Mass time. The Church itself is closed but the outer doors of the porch will be open. The Mass will be offered privately at 11.00am in Church: please try to make an act of Spiritual Communion during that time, which enables us to receive the grace and life from God which we so wish we could receive in reality in the Blessed Sacrament of Our Lord's Body and Blood.

On Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday in Holy Week, the Mass will be celebrated every day in S. Silas at 12.30pm. The Office will continue to be said in Church at 7.30am, 12 noon and 6.00pm. The lamps at the Shrines are lit, as usual, every day during the Mass. If you have any particular intentions for the daily Mass, let me know them and they will be offered. On Maundy Thursday, the Mass of the Lord's Supper will be celebrated at 7.30pm, and on Holy Saturday the Ceremonies of the Vigil and First Mass of Easter will be observed at 8.00pm. On Good Friday and Easter Day, although the church is closed, if you are not prevented by the guidelines or by your health and if you live nearby, you may care to walk past S. Silas during your daily exercise. There will be a lamp for you to light and leave at the foot of the Crucifix outside Church. Fr Graeme will be there silently to join you in prayer from 2.00 - 3.30 pm on Good Friday and 10.30 am - 12 noon on Easter Day. We cannot gather or stop there, nor can we go into Church, but we can leave behind a sign of our prayers for those we love and for ourselves. I shall therefore celebrate the Mass at 12 noon on Easter Day.
